

Hello City Council and residents,

My name is Jose Maldonado; I was born and raised in the City of Huntington Park and have continued to be a resident for the past 23 years of my life. I have grown to love the city and have had the opportunity to work for the city within it in the Community Development department. As someone with a degree in Economics, I understand the importance of efficiency in decision-making. This background has helped me approach the redistricting process thoughtfully, ensuring that population sizes are equitable and that each district reflects both community interests and economic realities. As it appears that the city has decided to go from at-large citywide elections to vote by district, I will take opportunity to participate in the city's redistricting process by providing a map of what I believe to be the fairest approach. I have created a proposed map that I believe reflects fair representation and preserves the integrity of our communities. My goal was to create a map that is not only compliant with federal and state regulations but also practical and fair for all residents.

### 1. Guiding Principles

When drawing my map, I focused on equal population across districts to ensure compliance with legal requirements. The City has a population of 55,141 of those 25,545 individuals are eligible to vote and in previous elections only 8,726 votes were collected. In theory each district should have 11,028 individuals with about 5,109 potential voters. It is important to note that based on previous election data on average each section will have about 1,745.5 people voting so a simple majority of 873 votes is required to win an election. Having such a low number of voters is dangerous, therefore the districts are as equally distributed as possible. As can be seen on my map there is a deviation of +/- 38 individuals.

Also please look at the charts above to see that every district would have approximately the required number of individuals to have a fair election where everyone is equally represented. Each district has a population of about 11,028.2 individuals and a voting population of about 1,745.5. I made sure to keep contiguity and compactness, keeping districts connected and avoiding irregular shapes while also preserving communities of interest, such as neighborhoods with shared cultural and economic ties.



### **Southwest Huntington Park (Blue)**

The southwest district includes high-density residential neighborhoods, industrial areas to the west, and the vibrant downtown to the east. While this area currently has a lower population of only 38 individuals, however, future mixed-use developments downtown will help balance that deficit. This forward-thinking approach ensures the district remains equitable as the city evolves.

### **Central Huntington Park (Purple)**

The central district is the heart of Huntington Park, encompassing a mix of medium- and low-density residential areas along with municipal buildings. Keeping this area unified ensures that residents near city services and government offices share representation. This district reflects the administrative and civic core of our community.

### **Southeast Huntington Park (Yellow)**

The southeast district is primarily low-density residential, featuring Salt Lake Park and a key commercial corridor. These neighborhoods value open space and family-oriented amenities, so grouping them together preserves their shared lifestyle and priorities. This district represents a quieter, more suburban character within the city.

### **Northeast Huntington Park (Red)**

The northeast district combines high- and medium-density housing with a sliver of manufacturing. This area is particularly special because it is surrounded on three sides by other municipalities, each with different development patterns. By keeping this section unified within Huntington Park, we ensure that residents have a strong voice in local decisions and are not overshadowed by external influences. This district reflects the economic diversity and resilience of our city.

After driving through these neighborhoods, the differences in how each zone lives are clear. My map respects these distinctions while promoting fairness, balance, and alignment with the city's long-term vision. It is a plan that honors our history, supports future growth, and ensures every resident has a voice.

#### **4. Fair Representation**

I designed my map with fairness as the guiding principle. The city is divided into five sections that are as evenly distributed as possible to avoid any bias or disproportionate representation. By ensuring that each district has a balanced population, every resident has an equal voice in local governance. This approach reflects the spirit of equity and transparency that our community deserves.

#### **7. Conclusion**

Each of these five districts represents a unique part of Huntington Park, with its own character, priorities, and needs. From the historic industrial and commercial corridors in the north to the vibrant downtown and future mixed-use opportunities in the southwest, every zone plays a vital role in shaping our city's identity. The central district anchors our civic life, while the southeast offers family-oriented neighborhoods and open spaces, and the northeast stands out as a strategic area surrounded on three sides by other municipalities, requiring strong representation to protect local interests. By dividing the city as evenly as possible, this map ensures that population sizes are balanced and that no district is given undue advantage. These boundaries are as fair and practical as any map can be, fully compliant with federal and state regulations, including equal population requirements and the Voting Rights Act. Most importantly, this approach guarantees the voices of all residents, regardless of where they live. Please closely exam these districts as they will be represented in the decisions that shape Huntington Park's future.
