Elections Code Section 21130(f) language:

f)... the districting body shall issue a report that explains the basis on which the districting body made its decisions in achieving compliance with the requirements and criteria described in this section, including, as to each neighborhood, community of interest, city, or census designated place that was split into two or more districts, the reason for that split.

Disclosure:

National Demographics Corporation (NDC), on behalf of the City of Huntington Park, has analyzed the City's adopted map and prepared the following analysis of the map's compliance with the criteria of Elections Code Section 21130:

21130(a): Population Equality

The ideal population in a 5-district map for Huntington Park is 11,028. In the adopted map, the largest district has a population of 11,292 (2.39% over the ideal) and the smallest district has a population of 10,503 (4.76% under the target population). At a total difference of 7.15% between the largest and smallest districts, the districts in the adopted map are well within the "presumed constitutional" 10% range of state and federal law, and the deviations all exist to achieve compliance with Federal and/or State criteria.

21130(b): Voting Rights Act reports

The City fully complied with the reporting requirements of Section 21130(b). That report is posted to the City's districting project website.

21130(c)(1): Contiguity

All of the districts are contiguous.

21130(c)(2): Minimize divisions of each "local neighborhood or local communities of interest"

Public comment and review of the city's geography identified local neighborhoods or local communities of interest, each was mapped, and the map was shared publicly during the districting process.

1. The Maywood Strip community is entirely in one district, in particular uniting the community of interest impacted by the Excide Battery Plant contamination.
2. The northern industrial community is entirely in one district.
3. The western industrial community is entirely in one district.
4. The Salt Lake Park neighborhood is unified as much as contiguity and population requirements allow.
5. District 4 keeps a concentrated community of apartment buildings united.
6. The Walnut Park-adjacent neighborhoods (one north of Walnut Park, the other east of Walnut Park) are each undivided.

21130(c)(3) does not apply to a city

21130(c)(4): Follow easily identifiable boundaries

The boundaries of the adopted districts entirely follow easily-recognized roads: Randolph Street, Santa Fe Avenue, Pacific Boulevard, Saturn Avenue, Gage Avenue, Passaic Street, Arbutus Avenue, and Florence Avenue. No district boundaries jog back and forth along smaller roads anywhere in the city.

21130(c)(5): Compactness

No population is "bypassed in favor of more distant populations" anywhere in the City.

21130(d): No purpose of favoring or discriminating against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party

The map does not favor or discriminate against any incumbent, political candidate, or political party. No consideration of incumbents, political candidates or political parties was provided by the demographic consultant (NDC), who did not know where the incumbents or any potential candidates reside and did not use any partisan data or election results, nor was any such consideration part of the statements during the public hearing or the Council deliberations.

21130(e): Do not prioritize any criterion over the criteria listed in Section (c) of the statute

The adopted map does not prioritize any criterion over the criteria listed in Section (c) of the statute. After complying with all of the Federal and State criteria, the map did achieve the local concern that as many districts as possible touch Randolph Street.
